STATISTICS AND INFORMATION



The Town Council is administered as a first tier local government authority in an area whose County Authority responsibilities are maintained by Surrey County Council and whose District Council responsibilities are maintained by Reigate & Banstead Borough Council.

There are approximately 22,000 people residing within the boundary of this Town Council of which 16,842 are registered electors as at 1 April 2013.

The Precept is collected on the Town Council's behalf by Reigate & Banstead Borough Council. For the fiscal year 2013/14. it is set at £283,890. This equates to a sum of £33.95 per band D household. Please refer to the Finance Chairman's report for more details about the changes in tax base.

FINANCE & GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE REPORT

Committee Responsibilities

The committee is tasked with supervising the Council's administration, ensuring that it complies with the appropriate legislations and acting as guardian of community assets. Its remit covers the rules under which the Council carries out its duties, Health & Safety, Insurance, and Risk Assessments, in addition to Accounts and Financial Regulations. In carrying out these tasks the Council aspires to follow best practice. With continuous changes to the rules under which we operate, the Town Clerk, Alan Jones, is a fundamental support in keeping us volunteer Councillors abreast of all developments.

Finance

The timing of this meeting means that three financial years are touched upon.

It can be reported that, since last year's Town Meeting, the accounts for 2011/12 have been approved by both the Internal and External Auditors and the necessary declarations signed off by the Town Clerk as Responsible Financial Officer. The year just ending, 2012/13, is forecast to make important savings compared to the original budget. This means that the Council has avoided dipping into reserves as originally planned.

The following figures summarize net expenditure, including that for the coming year 2013/14.

Financial year 2013/14

The requirement of £305,000 shown above translates to a town element of Council Tax of £33.95 for a Band D (average) household, an increase for the year of 65p. The five years since "the crash" have seen below inflation increases. The cumulative effect is that tax has increased by 4% compared to inflation of 17%.

It has to be recorded that, following the changes to the way Council Tax benefits are managed from 1 April 2013, our tax base has been reduced with a consequent reduction in precept of £21,000 to £284,000. This reduction has been compensated with a grant from Reigate & Banstead Borough Council. This should not be interpreted as a cost to Reigate and Banstead, as it has been recovered from changes to empty property relief and other changes to allowances. However, being defined as "a grant", it does mean that there is some uncertainty for future years.



This Council is very conscious that Horley residents pay more than other Borough residents and would not wish to widen this difference. No government support trickles down via Reigate & Banstead, so finding cash for projects is difficult. Unless grant sources or new revenue streams can be identified, the choice is to do without, or raise the town tax. This is the backdrop to our policy that income should cover costs for Allotments, Football, and Hall hire. We have increased all fees but continue to recognize that Junior Football is significantly subsidised. As would be expected, costs are continually scrutinized, whilst at the same time striving to maintain standards. We cannot, however, avoid the fact that this Council faces the same inflationary pressures as everybody else. Maintaining standards whilst containing tax increases is becoming increasingly difficult. This may lead to some uncomfortable spending decisions and challenges to find new revenues.

Reserves

Managing and planning reserves is an integral part of budgeting. As well as providing funds to cover unforeseen costs, they include money put aside towards future requirements. Foreseeable heavy maintenance, replacement equipment and new projects need to be identified in advance, and funds put aside to avoid big spikes in tax demands. Whilst lower than budgeted expenditure has provided us a breathing space, our reserves, whilst sufficient for "normal requirements" are currently insufficient to enable us to pay for major new equipment (ie skate park replacement) without outside funding or tax increases.

Horley within Reigate & Banstead

Alongside our small neighbours Salfords and Sidlow, we are the only Parishes in this Borough. The issue of paying for our own facilities as well as contributing to those in the rest of the Borough has long been a subject for discussion. Horley contributes 15% of Borough tax revenues. At a basic level this means, for example, we pay for our own playground equipment and contribute 15% towards playground equipment in the rest of the Borough. This Committee, having analysed what it sees as the costs involved, has recommended that Horley Town Council take this forward to the Borough to receive the views of senior Officers and Members.

The Innes Sports Pavilion

It would be irresponsible, in this report, not to alert the meeting of a potential difficulty.

The Innes Sports Pavilion at Court Lodge, used by football teams, is owned by this Council and leased to Horley Sports and Social Club on a full repairing lease. The roof has been identified as requiring significant urgent repairs to safeguard the building. The Council is currently in talks with the Club as to how these works are to be funded.

Web Developments and Communications

This Council, whilst recognising that there is still a significant element of our population without access to the internet, does need to improve its web offering. A system at the forefront of Council design ten years ago needs to be brought up to date. It is the showcase of Horley, receiving several thousand page visits a month. It needs to be easier to use, with the capability of being updated/managed by our staff rather than via a hosting company. There is a requirement to update information faster and meet the demands of social networking and smartphones, whilst providing the appropriate links to local organisations.

I would particularly like to make reference to our newest member of staff, Rose Cavanagh, who quickly organised matters so that I was able to receive Receipts and Payments accounts within 48hrs of a period end. Every year brings its different challenges but I think the Committee has worked satisfactorily. It has not always been easy but I think there is a full recognition of the challenges ahead to be faced.

This has been a very strange year with the wettest drought in history! All the parks have been absolutely soaked for most of summer, as well as all autumn and winter. I can remember touring the town centre with the Deputy Clerk, Carol, with the hose pipe ban imminent. We had to try to decide where to put fewer hanging baskets, but also add more planters to still get maximum input. I hope you all enjoyed the result, as much as I did. I was also very proud that the Town Centre yet again achieved its Silver Gilt in the South & South East in Bloom competition, and we again achieved Silver Gilt in the Memorial Gardens and Horley Recreation Ground.

We have had to cut our cloth to suit this year due to financial pressures in these times of austerity. Hence there were no major projects this year. However, with the help of Gatwick Green Space Partnership and Community Payback we have carried on the improvements in Riverside Garden Park. I am sure that those who visit the site will appreciate the difference.

Improvements have been made at Church Meadows again with the help of Community Payback, with the clearing of the bank along the River Mole (getting rid of Himalayan Balsam). Also the wild flower meadow

planting was admired by many including the South & South East in Bloom Judges. It certainly helped the butterfly and insect population too!

This year we re-marked the pitches at Court Lodge playing fields so that instead of four we now have five. This will mean that the pitches can be used in rotation and thus hopefully reduce wear and tear.

Once again we have had visits from the Circus and Funfair. The Queen's Diamond Jubilee was celebrated with a Procession of floats through the town and a Fun Day at Horley Recreation Ground. This year sees the revival of the Horley Carnival on 13 July, which is being organised by many local groups, including the Town Council, Chamber of Commerce, Round Table, Lions Club and local Guides.

Something new this year is the installation of concrete table tennis tables at Horley Recreation Ground, Court Lodge Fields and Michael Crescent Centenary Park. These have been provided as a result of fundraising by the Local Pubs, organised by Horley & District Pubwatch. Our thanks must go to Jerry Hudson, Pubwatch Treasurer, for all his hard work, which is very much appreciated. We hope that the tables will be well used, once the weather improves. Also a concrete chess table with seats has been installed in the Ornamental Gardens at Horley Recreation Ground, partly funded by the Gatwick Airport Community Trust.

I am pleased to report that Horley in Bloom is "still blooming" and we should be proud of it, as it certainly does brighten up the surroundings. Sadly, due to the bad weather, work commitments and illness, the Allotments competition did not take place. I am hoping however that the judging can take place twice this coming year so that all crops can be taken into account.

Finally, I would like to thank all the members of the Leisure & Amenities Committee for their hard work over the year, particularly to those members who assist with the weekly inspections of our parks. Also, as ever, I express my thanks to all the hard working staff for their dedication and support over the year.

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

The Town Council is a legal consultee on all planning applications within the parish boundary and the Planning & Development Committee acts for the Council on these matters.

The Committee also considers any planning matters from neighbouring authorities such as Crawley, Mole Valley and Tandridge Borough and District Councils, which may have an impact on the town and its residents. During the past year the Committee has considered a total of 219 Planning Applications for Horley. These comprise:-

- 8 Consultations from Surrey County Council (SCC) on schools and others from neighbouring authorities such as Crawley (including Gatwick Airport) and Mole Valley;
- 16 for large developments of 6 or more dwellings;
- 15 for small developments of less than 6 dwellings;
- 107 for extensions, loft conversions, conservatories and fencing;
- 44 covering tree preservation orders;
- 29 for commercial properties including changes of use for retail units.

The Committee is also responsible for the following:-

Gatwick Airport:

We continue to be an active member of the Gatwick Airport Consultative Committee (GATCOM) along with representing GATCOM on the Noise and Track Monitoring Advisory Group which now incorporates the Ground Noise Monitoring Committee.

During the past year, we have attended a number of briefings on issues such as the Airport's Master Plan, Ground Access Strategy and the Future Business Plan. As a member of GATCOM we also make comments on these documents.

The coming years will see this Council becoming increasingly involved in the debate on the proposed expansion of Gatwick Airport. It is our intention to seek a briefing from Gatwick Airport Ltd (GAL) on their future plans for the Airport, particularly in respect of a second runway and also from the Gatwick Area Conservation Campaign who will be opposing any second runway. At some time in the future, the Council will be considering ways of gathering the views of our residents on this subject.

Highways:

Based upon information from Councillors, residents groups and individual residents, we continue to report to SCC on pot holes, defective street lights, damaged signage and any other highways related matters. In addition, reports to the County Council are copied in to our County Council members, Cllrs Kay Hammond and Dorothy Ross-Tomlin. This Council monitors the Highways Department's roads programme to ensure that Horley receives it share of spending on major works such as road resurfacing.

Local Transport:

The plans for the two major housing developments include provision for a high quality bus service.

Whilst we support that aim we have had, and continue to have, concerns on the planned route the buses will take. At this time, we are working with local residents and our Borough and County Councillors, to address these concerns in the North East sector.

Railway Matters:

The subway, as always, continues to be a source of concern in respect of flooding and graffiti. The instances of flooding are much reduced and we are currently investigating the possibility of using the Community Payback teams to remove the graffiti.

Rail services to and from Horley will no doubt be affected by the introduction of a Super Franchise which will absorb the current Southern and Coast to Capital operators. The process has been delayed following the debacle of the West Coast franchise.

Horley Regeneration:

The Horley Regeneration Forum has only met twice in the past year, which has been a matter of some concern to this Council.

The North East sector continues to develop with work now started on Phase 3. It is anticipated that work on the North West development will start soon now that the Section 106 Agreement has been concluded and the majority of the land has been secured by the developers.

A Planning Application has been approved for the preliminary works to construct the bridge over the River Mole and the associated link roads from the A217.

The re-development of the Newman House site has begun though this Council has expressed its concerns on the proposals (shared with residents and businesses) with regard to scale and design. I regret to report that these concerns did not receive support at Reigate & Banstead Borough Council.

On the former Court Lodge Infants School site, work has started on the Care Home. On completion, it is expected that construction of the new Horley Baptist Church will commence.

This Council's Strategy and Forward Planning Group is currently carrying out a survey of residents' views of Horley, both positive and negative. The Group is also seeking to secure the views and engagement of the local business community in a workshop focused on building a sustainable and attractive environment for all business sectors in the Horley Area. Support for this workshop is also being sought from Reigate and Banstead Borough Council.

Horley Town Management Group:

This body was formerly known as the Town Centre Management Group but was re-named to reflect its remit to cover all areas of the town. The group consists of Town, Borough and County Councillors, as well as representatives from the Horley & District Chamber of Commerce, residents groups, Horley Association of Traders (HATs) and a number of local businesses. The Group had become moribund for some time but has recently been rejuvenated with some exciting plans and ideas on transforming Horley and its perception to the outside world. Some of these will include how we can address the decline in our shopping areas using finances from the High Street Innovation Fund ("Portas Fund") as well as making contacts with the landlords of commercial premises within the town. The Group is very aware of the difficult task that lies ahead and looks forward to having the support of the residents of Horley.

- Surrey Fire & Rescue Service on local changes to fire cover for Horley following the decision by West Sussex to remove the last appliance from the Horley station.
- The annual update from Leon Hibbs the Borough Council's Air Quality Monitoring Officer.
- An update on highways matters from the Surrey County Council Highways Department.

In conclusion, I would like to thank my Vice Chairman, Councillor Tony Schofield, and all members of the Committee for their hard work and support throughout the past year. My thanks, also to the Clerk and staff, without whose support our job would be impossible.

Nominations for Town Awards are invited every year, when any resident can complete a nomination form, together with a seconder, to propose an individual for outstanding service or commitment to the town. Horley Town Council is responsible for the administration and final selection of award winners according to strict guidelines and criteria.

The Awards Sub Committee reviews the nominations and makes its recommendations to the Council. Award winners receive a Town Badge, a Certificate of Commendation and their Citation. Presentations are usually made at the Town Meeting or at other appropriate events, subject to the award winners' approval.

This year we are delighted to be presenting awards to Mr Doug Kilborn and Mr Peter Moxley.

Since retirement, Doug Kilborn has made a strong voluntary commitment to the task of spearheading the management of and improvements to the Strawson Hall, originally given to the community of Horley by G F Strawson in 1919. Grant aid has been obtained and substantial improvements made to the fabric of Strawson Hall, thanks to the huge contribution made by Doug, supported by the Management Team.

Peter Moxley has had an immense impact on the lives of many people, old and young, in the Horley area. He is a fundraiser at Young Epilepsy and has been a dedicated and enthusiastic member of the Horley Lions Club since 1982, as well as being actively involved with the Horley Cricket and Hockey Club. Syd Fewtrell - Town Award Holder



FULL COUNCIL ATTENDANCE STATISTICS




FINANCE & GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE ATTENDANCE STATISTICS




